

time, my This Month column focused on quality of life issues in our Village and I urged residents to get involved to help make our Village a

better place to live and work. As we enter the holiday season and approach the end of 2007, I wanted to reflect back on the past year and the many positive developments that have taken place in our community and to acknowledge just a few individuals who have been instrumental in maintaining the quality of life in our Village.

Over the past year, the RVC Pride Beautification Committee, which was initiated by then-Trustee Suzanne Sullivan and is comprised entirely of volunteers, has taken root. Under the very able leadership of Co-Chairs Dr. Cyd Charrow and Bob Schenone, on May 14, 2007, RVC Pride issued a comprehensive report and recommendations for maintaining and enhancing the beauty of Rockville Centre (a copy of the report is available on the Village website at www.rvcny.us).

As part of the effort, Leslie Price, an RVC Pride volunteer, also singlehandedly prepared and submitted a 53page, \$4.1 million grant proposal to Nassau County for the beautification of Mill River. And on November 3, RVC Pride volunteers—adults and children—completed a successful Clean-Up Day at five sites around the Village. RVC Pride is a wonderful example of volunteerism at its best.

Other positive developments include the implementation of a Village-wide plastics recycling program, the Park Ranger program to protect and maintain our parks and recreation facilities, as well as numerous traffic and parking initiatives designed to make our roads and streets safer. These programs were

Last year at this spearheaded by Harry Weed, Tony Brunetta and Jack McKeon and their respective Village departments.

In addition, a few months ago, the Village's decision not to renew the business license of the nightclub Rapture on Sunrise Highway was upheld and the club, which had been a problem spot for some time, was closed.

Over the last several months, the Village Board has also been working hard to address quality of life issues and has passed several significant pieces of legislation designed to maintain the appearance and quality of life in Rockville Centre.

Specifically, the Village Board has passed: (i) density restrictions of 18 units per acre on new developments, (ii) a new public nuisance law to help combat problem businesses and properties, and (iii) a social host law analogous to the one adopted by Nassau County in an effort to control teen drinking and alcohol related problems.

While there is always more work to be done, I'm proud to say that over the past year Village residents and Village government have worked diligently, hand in hand, to maintain the quality of life here in Rockville Centre.

Finally, in the spirit of the holiday season, I would like to urge everyone to take a moment to remember our troops overseas by donating at The American Legion Hall (197 Maple Avenue), and to consider as well helping those less fortunate by contributing to the many worthy local charities and organizations here in Rockville Centre such as The Annual Holiday Food Drive at the Rec Center, The Raymar Children's Fund at Covert Elementary School, The Rosa Lee Young Childhood Center, The Giving Tree at St. Agnes Cathedral, Temple B'nai Sholom, Central Synagogue, and Trinity Lutheran Church, just to name a few.

Residents are also reminded that bulky items of trash too large for regular garbage containers may only be placed at the curbside on designated Wednesdays and only after calling the Rockville Centre Sanitation Department at 678-9216 before Noon on Tuesday for a Wednesday pick-up.

### **Tax Office Announcements**

Applications for **partial** exemption from Village real estate taxes are now available and must be filed by December 31. If approved, exemptions take effect June 1, 2008.

Exemptions are available to volunteer firefighters with five years or more of certified service and to veterans based on the date and type of military service. The value of the veterans' exemptions varies with the status of the claimant: non-combat: \$745; combat: \$1,242 and up to \$2,790 based on the percent of disability. Exemptions are also available to disabled homeowners and to senior homeowners 65 and older with a 2006 gross income not exceeding \$35,400.

## Police Urge Caution During Burglary Season

Although Rockville Centre is very well protected and the crime rate is very low, the holiday season is, unfortunately, a prime time for home burglaries. Criminals know that homes are often filled with gift purchases this time of year and that people are often away from home attending events and parties.

RVC Police Commissioner Jack McKeon said, "Burglaries are crimes of opportunity. Burglars go for the easy targets first, so don't leave inviting items in plain sight behind unlocked doors and windows. Lock your cars, lock your garage, lock your house."

To reduce your chances of becoming the victim of a burglary, the police recommend the following: 1. If you have an alarm system,

keep it armed even when you are at home. (Village permits are required for all alarms.)

### 2. Keep doors, windows, and all entry points closed and locked. If

you need to keep windows open, ask your alarm company to provide specially- wired screens. Look outside before opening your door.

3. Keep lights on outside your home at night. Be sure to try to illuminate trees and shrubs along the house, where people might hide. Keep ladders or other items that could help an intruder enter a ground floor window in a locked garage or shed.

4. Keep an eye on your neighborhood and report anything or anyone that is suspicious to the police by using 911. It is always better to be safe than sorry.

(Remember, calls from cell phones go first to Nassau County; calls from land lines come right to the Rockville Centre Police.)
