Irene: Quick Clean-up, Repairs

Irene came calling:

Mill River overflowed

its banks and flooded

South Park Avenue

and Riverside Drive.

Trees and limbs fell,

blocking roads and

downing electric wires

throughout the Village.

ckville Centre was well prepared and Village departments responded quickly to the extensive damage brought on by Hurricane Irene in late August.

Mayor Fran Murray declared the Village's first state of emergency on Saturday, August 27 and imposed a curfew of 11 p.m. to keep people and vehicles off the streets as the storm approached. Businesses complied with a request to close by 10 p.m.

About 1,000 homes lost power when the storm blew in, but, 24 hours later, around 100 remained without electricity and all were restored within 48 hours. The electric department also used a new mapping system to assign work crews more efficiently and a new emergency phone system that can be turned on in major storms. (LIPA, by contrast, lost 40 percent of its customers, many for more than a week.)

More than 100 trees and large limbs were uprooted or snapped and fell into roadways, houses, sidewalks and power lines, but all through-roads were passable on Monday.

Workers from the Department of Public Works labored through the night and into Sunday evening clearing drains, removing trees and sandbagging flood areas to keep the streets clear.

Following National Incident
Management System protocols, Village
department heads met periodically
before, during and after the storm and
consulted with county, state and federal
emergency management officials.

Staffers from many departments worked through the weekend answering phones, reporting outages and downed trees, preparing emergency notifications, and fielding questions from anxious residents.

The Mayor himself worked through the weekend and the days that followed, visiting trouble areas, often with Deputy Mayor Nancy Howard.

At the August 29 Board of Trustees meeting, Mayor Murray told the assembled department heads, "You have done a superb job and the people of Rockville Centre are grateful."

Many Ways of Serving Rockville Centre

Since I last authored this column, I have been privileged to welcome Mayor Murray, Deputy Mayor Howard and Trustee Sepe to the Board. It has been an exciting two months since and I have been honored to work with my new colleagues as we implement common sense policies and plans to make living in Rockville Centre that much more enjoyable.

I was proud to vote with my new colleagues to do

away with metered parking after 6 p.m. and in my two years sitting on this Board I have never had a more favorable response to an action by the Board of Trustees. The Board is currently looking at other ways to make the Rockville Centre experience even more enjoyable such as online payments of utility bills and more convenient parking meters and, most importantly, Mayor Murray continues to develop ways for the Village to continue its modernization program utilizing alternative sources of revenue so as to keep costs to the taxpayers at a minimum.

I look forward to working with the Board to continue making Rockville Centre the amazing place to live, work and raise a family that it has always been.
