Village of Rockville Centre Introduces Mobile Phone Payment for Parking

Mayor Francis X. Murray and the Board of Trustees announced the launch of "Whoosh!," a mobile phone application that will enable users to pay on-street parking meters by cell phones, tablets, and computers. Motorists in Parking Field #27 can now pay for parking in the Village of Rockville Centre with their smart phones by using an app.

"Whoosh! helps make mobile parking

payment an alternative to conventional coin and bill-operated parking meters," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "This new system will increase convenience and efficiency for residents."

The new system is available in parking field 27, located adjacent to the St. Agnes Cathedral. Before rolling out the system throughout the Village, the system will be tested to make sure it is running correctly and

smoothly. The Whoosh! mobile phone app can be downloaded from the App Store onto an iPhone or the Google Play Store onto an Android device. Users register their license plates and credit card with the Whoosh! system through the app or through www.whooshstore.com. A nominal convenience fee of \$0.50 is added to each

Village Election Coming

The Incorporated Village of Rockville Centre will hold a special Village election on Tuesday, June 19, 2018. The following offices with the following terms will be contested for: one Trustee, for one year, to fill the balance of an unexpired term.

If you are interested in running for office, you may pick up a package with relative details in early April from the Clerk Treasurer's Office on the first floor of Village Hall. The Village is currently accepting applications for absentee ballots for the general election.

All voting in the June 19, 2018 Village election will be conducted at the John A. Anderson Recreation Center on North Oceanside Road from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. Eligible persons wishing to vote, must be registered with the Nassau County Board of Elections at least ten days prior to the election.

Village Hall Comments by Trustee Michael Sepe The Long Beach Road Corridor



The Village has long struggled with zoning issues for the businesses along Long Beach Road from Kennedy Street, southward past Merrick Road. Referred to by some of us as “Littletown,” these businesses are typically only one lot deep in that they border residential lots. Unlike our downtown

areas, having these lots literally back up to residential homes creates numerous issues.

Problems were spotted more than ten-years ago in the Village Code, technically the Village could have permitted multi-story business structures to be built. Only certain parking regulations prevented that from happening. After numerous studies and dead ends, an effort was undertaken to preserve the unique character of this area. Our first step four-years ago was to enact new requirements for Green Zone Buffers between residential and commercial lots. While a good first step, obviously more needed to be done.

The challenge has been to preserve the residential character of the neighboring homes while at the same time protecting existing and future businesses. The only practical solution was to create an entirely new business district known as business A-1. Known as Village Code Section 1804, the new section is the

result of more than two years of work by the Village Board, RVC Building Department and our Village Counsel. As with many changes to our laws, rather than simply rewriting code sections, we were required to obtain an independent study, perform an environmental assessment, submit the proposed section to the Nassau County Planning Commission and hold our own public hearings.

The most important of these changes to the Village Code is the locking in of what already exists – that all of these businesses be no higher than one story with an allowance for signage. Second, because of the nearby homes, and after an exhaustive review, the Village Board has completed a list of what types of future businesses will be permitted in this newly created district. Generally, office space, general business, retail, automotive, banking and restaurants will continue to be permitted. Because of parking concerns, the new Code will not permit

nightclubs or drive-thru establishments.

We’ve seen an unfortunate amount of personal conflict and super-heated rhetoric between our neighbors over these questions. Especially in our social media age, the speed at which false rumors about this area have spread has been shocking. A friend and resident recently ran into me outside of the Village. He listed a number rumors and beliefs that some residents had about the area that literally left me wondering if we were even talking about the same topic. After considerable time was spent going through the history and details of what was and is actually happening, I was grateful that he later told me that I helped in some small way to dispel some of the rumors that residents of the area were most upset by.


This experience has been one of those so called teachable moments about what doesn’t work, and what does.

Village Rolls Out 2018 Road Program

In 2018, the Village of Rockville Centre will be repairing nearly 3 miles of roadway. Sites are selected based on a number of factors including pedestrian safety, pavement condition, and other utility upgrade needs such as water mains.

“The quality and safety of our roadways are a critical component of keeping Rockville Centre a desirable community,” commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. “With 50 miles of roadway, the Village of Rockville Centre is committed to maintaining and improving Village roadways for residents and visitors. In

nearly seven years, I am very proud to say we have completed approximately 20 miles, nearly half of our roadways, including Maple Avenue and North Park Avenue in our downtown.

The road construction process includes a number of stages. If road improvements are being done in your neighborhood, you can expect to see the following typical process stages occur: surveying, water main upgrades, drainage upgrades, electrical lighting and infrastructure upgrades, new base and top asphalt, new stop bars, and new concrete curbs, pads, driveway ramps and handicap ramps. In addition, if there is a tree that will be impacted by the excavation or if the tree is deceased, it will be removed. Each roadway is expected to take three to five months depending on weather.

Phase One of the current roadway program continues as weather permits with parts of Rockaway Avenue, Leon Court, Wilson Lane, Woodland Avenue, and Amherst Court. Phase two of the road program is in progress and is comprised of eight roads including parts of Hughes Street, Combes Avenue, Kennedy Avenue, and Bennett Street. Phase three of the road program also includes parts of South Village Avenue, Locust Avenue, Major Court, and Blenheim Court, as well as parts of Yale Place. In addition to the road repairs, the Village will provide a welcoming environment for visitors and commuters through its streetscape projects that will include Morris Avenue from Sunrise Highway to Maple Avenue.

Unfortunately, this type of work will have impacts to residents during the construction period. However, we do strive to minimize impact as much as possible, and will make all efforts to provide advanced notice for planned access or service impacts.
