## Rockville Centre Police Department Marks New Leadership with Promotions as Veteran Inspector Retires

The Rockville Centre Police Department welcomed a new chapter of leadership as three veteran officers were sworn into new roles during the March meeting of the Village of Rockville Centre Board of Trustees. Family members, colleagues, and Village officials gathered as Matthew Vickery was promoted to Inspector, N. Firoz to Lieutenant, and Michael Farrell to Sergeant, each recognized for years of steady service and dedication to the community.



Mayor Francis X. Murray said the promotions reflect both experience and trust earned on the streets of the Village. "These officers represent the very best of the Rockville Centre Police Department," Murray said. "They have spent their careers protecting our residents, mentoring younger officers, and leading by example. We have complete confidence in their ability to guide the Rockville Centre Police Department forward and continue delivering the high level of service our community expects."

Inspector Matthew Vickery's promotion is especially meaningful for his family. Raised in Westbury, Vickery earned a degree in criminal justice from Northeastern University before beginning his career with the New York City Police Department in Brooklyn. He joined the Rockville Centre Police Department in 2008, where he

served alongside his father, Mike Vickery, a respected forty-year member of the force. Promoted to sergeant in 2015, Vickery supervised night patrol officers before advancing to Lieutenant in 2021. He later led both Patrol and Support and oversaw the department's training unit. As Inspector and Executive Officer, he will now help manage daily operations across the department.

Inspector Vickery is stepping into his new role following the retirement of Inspector Chris Romance. After nearly thirty years with the department, Inspector Romance retired on January 30, 2026. Since joining in 1997, he earned numerous commendations as a patrol officer, including Cop of the Year, before serving in the Traffic Enforcement Unit and becoming the department's primary training instructor. He later commanded both the Traffic Enforcement and Training units as a sergeant and went on to serve as lieutenant and Commanding Officer of Support. As Inspector and Executive Officer, he oversaw the department's daily operations. He also served as the village's Deputy Emergency Manager and is a graduate of the FBI National Academy.

Mayor Murray offered his thanks for Romance's long record of service. "Inspector Romance dedicated his career to this village and set a standard for professionalism that will continue to



guide this department for years to come," continued Mayor Murray. "We are deeply grateful for everything he has done for our community and we wish him a happy and well-deserved retirement."

Lieutenant N. Firoz brings nearly three decades of experience to his new role. He began his career with the New York City Police Department in Queens transit patrol before joining Rockville Centre in 2002. After years in patrol assignments, he was promoted to Sergeant in 2019 and served as a night shift supervisor. He now steps into a broader leadership position while continuing to serve the community.

Sergeant Michael Farrell's path to promotion includes service with the New York City Police Department in both Queens and Brooklyn, where he rose to the rank of Sergeant. He joined Rockville Centre in 2015 and has since built a reputation as a dependable and steady leader.

"This is a moment of both gratitude and confidence," said Police Commissioner Randy Dodd. "We thank Inspector Romance for everything he gave to this department, and we are proud to see these talented officers take the next step. Each of these officers has demonstrated professionalism, integrity, and strong leadership throughout their careers. The future of the Rockville Centre Police Department is very bright."

## 2026 Spring Hydrant Flushing

## Village of Rockville Centre Storm Water Guide

Unlike waste water that goes into our sanitary sewers, storm water, and all that it is carrying, is not treated before being discharged to our surrounding water bodies. Storm Water comes from precipitation that flows across the ground or pavement when it rains or when snow and ice melt.

Storm water pollution can harm fish & other aquatic wildlife, kill native vegetation, destroy aquatic habitats, and make recreational areas unsafe and unpleasant. Nutrients carried by storm water may also cause undesirable algae and vegetative growth.

Substances carried by storm water that are considered to be pollutants are: sediment, trash, and debris, oil, grease, and toxic chemicals, soap and paint products from outdoor maintenance activities. Please help protect our storm water by:

- Do not over-water. If water flows off your yard onto your driveway or sidewalk, your system is over watering.
- Do not rake or blow leaves or clippings into the street, gutter or storm drain. Instead, dispose of waste by

composting or bagging it and placing it with your household waste for pickup.

• Follow directions on pesticides and fertilizers, (measure, do not estimate amounts). Do not use if rain is predicted within 48 hours.

• Always pick up after your pet. Flush waste down the toilet or dispose of it in the trash.

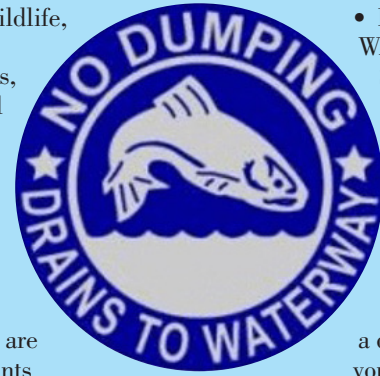
• NEVER DEPOSIT PET WASTE DIRECTLY IN STORM DRAIN!

• Pool and spa water must be dechlorinated and be free of excess acid, alkali or color.

• When draining your pool all water should be directed to a drywell on your property.

• Take your vehicle to a commercial car wash whenever possible. If you wash your vehicle at home, choose soaps or detergents labeled nontoxic, phosphate free or biodegradable.

• Take items such as used batteries, oven cleaners, automotive fluids, painting products, TVs and computer monitors to a household Hazardous Waste Collection Center.

### Real Estate Tax Due June 1, 2026

First half 2026/27 Village real estate tax bills due June 1, 2026, are scheduled to be mailed out the week of May 18th. First half taxes must be paid by June 30, 2026 to avoid late penalties.

Tax payments may be made online at [www.rvcny.gov](http://www.rvcny.gov) by electronic check or credit card, paid in person at Village Hall, dropped in the wall slot to the right of the Village Hall entrance at 1 College Place or mailed to P.O. Box 950, Rockville Centre NY 11571-0950.

New property owners and those who have satisfied, refinanced or sold their mortgage

to another lending institution should contact the Tax Office as soon as possible by emailing [klanzillotta@rvcny.us](mailto:klanzillotta@rvcny.us) or calling (516) 678-9205 to avoid billing errors that may lead to penalties for late real estate tax payments.

The Tax Office is located on the 1st floor of Village Hall at One College Place, and open

weekdays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

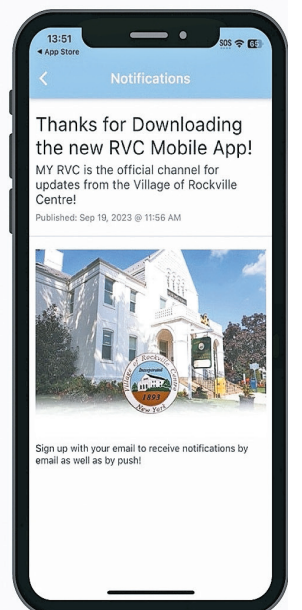
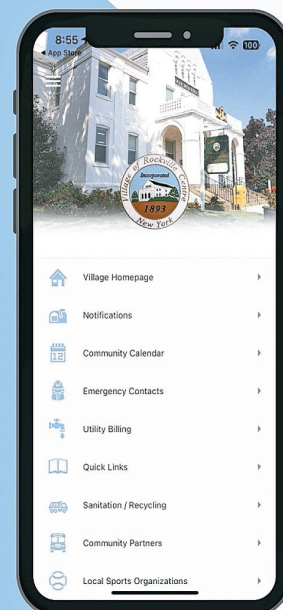

## The Village Budget Process: Understanding Today, Looking Ahead

Each year our Comptroller's office, under the Village Board's direction, undertakes the responsibility of preparing the annual Village budget, which estimates the cost of operating the Village for the upcoming fiscal year and determines the taxes required to fund those services. This process is one of the most important responsibilities of local government and is done with careful attention to maintaining the high-quality services that residents expect while managing taxpayer dollars responsibly.

It is important for residents to understand that the Village operates several separate funds. The Electric Fund and the Water Fund are self-sustaining and operate with their own budgets that are funded directly by the consumers who use those services. The Village operating budget, which is supported primarily through property taxes and other revenues, funds the municipal services that residents rely on every day. The budget process begins with each department head preparing a proposed budget for their department. Major departments include Police, Fire, the Department of Public Works, the Building Department, the Recreation

Center, the Senior Center, the MLK Center, the Comptroller's Office, Human Resources, and Administration. These proposals reflect the expected costs required to operate each department in the coming year.

Once those budgets are prepared, department heads meet with the Mayor, Village Administrator, Trustee liaisons, and the Comptroller. During these meetings the budgets are reviewed in detail. Employee rosters, salaries, and operating expenses are examined line by line and adjustments are made where appropriate. The Village takes a conservative approach to budgeting and plans for potential worst-case scenarios to ensure that essential services remain fully funded throughout the year. This careful review helps contain costs whenever possible while continuing to deliver the services that help make our Village a safe and vibrant community.

While the Village works diligently to control spending, there are significant costs in the budget that are mandated and outside of local control.

Under the New York State tax cap, a two percent increase would allow the Village to raise approximately \$1,263,907 in additional revenue. However, the Village is projected to see an increase of approximately \$1,049,643 in unfunded state mandated retirement costs for Village employees. This single mandated increase consumes the majority of what would be permitted under the tax cap.



Other mandated or contractual costs also continue to rise. Contractual full-time salary increases total more than \$540,000, including more than \$350,000 for police salaries and more than \$190,000 for other Village employees. Employee medical and dental insurance coverage is projected to increase by more than \$920,000. Debt service is expected to increase by more than \$800,000 due to borrowing that occurred during the current fiscal year, and workers compensation funding will increase by approximately \$322,000.

To help offset these pressures, the Village anticipates utilizing more than \$1.9 million

from fund balance. This includes \$600,000 from restricted funds set aside for employee benefits and tax certiorari settlements, as well as more than \$1.3 million from unassigned fund balance if necessary.

Despite significant mandated cost increases, the Village continues to take a conservative and responsible approach to budgeting. Staff works throughout the year to manage expenses carefully and identify opportunities to reduce costs wherever possible. The tentative budget proposes a tax increase of 3.5% above the state tax cap, which represents an estimated annual increase of \$385.94 for the average household.

Through careful financial management and thoughtful planning, the Village remains committed to maintaining the high level of public safety, infrastructure, and community services that residents value. Residents are encouraged to review the 2026-2027 tentative budget, which can be found on the Village website at [www.rvcny.gov](http://www.rvcny.gov), and attend the public hearing to be held at Village Hall on **April 13th at 7 p.m.** in order to stay engaged as the Village Board continues the budget process.

### Garbage Guidelines

- Use standard containers with detachable lids
- Containers may be NO larger than 32 gallons
  - Maximum Weight: 50 pounds
- Do not overfill plastic bags as they may tear

### Broken Glass & Sharp Objects

- Do NOT place broken glass in plastic bags
- Wrap glass in newspaper or brown paper, or place in a cardboard box
  - Tape securely and label "Broken Glass"

### No Contractor Debris

- Contractors must dispose of all building and landscaping debris
- The Village does not collect contractor or tradesperson waste

### Recycling & Weather Tips

- Bag all trash to prevent debris from blowing
- Tie paper recycling and place a heavy item on top
  - Break down and securely tie all cardboard
  - Bring empty bins in promptly after collection
